

English:

This half term we will be reading a range of stories written by the famous author Roald Dahl and discussing the style and features of his stories. We will focus on writing character descriptions. We will continue to work on punctuation skills including using exclamation marks, speech marks, commas and writing in paragraphs correctly. We are encouraging the children to be more independent writers by checking their own work for mistakes, adding extra information and checking it makes sense.

Questions:

What are the similarities and differences between Roald Dahl's stories? Are any of the characters similar? How do we know what Roald Dahl's 'made up' words mean?

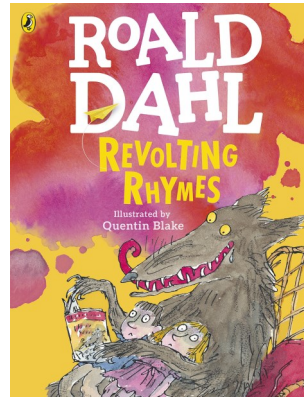
Reading

Children will be reading a range of texts, fiction, non-fiction and poetry. We will discuss the features of each genre of books as well as developing inference skills. We will focus on answering questions about a given text, with children expected to be able to retrieve information from what they have read.

Questions:

Find a word in the text that means xxx. Find an adverb in the text, how do you know it is an adverb? Use a dictionary to look up the meaning of xxx.

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This half term our topic will be based on *Roald Dahl* and much of our work will be cross-curricular, linking subjects wherever possible.

Maths:

We will use our knowledge of multiples of 2, 5 and 10, as well as groups of 3 and 4. We will work on missing number calculations, especially focusing on addition and subtraction with 2 or more numbers. We will continue to focus on developing mental maths skills, problem solving and investigative work, encouraging the children to apply their learning to different situations to solve problems. We will also be describing the properties of 2D and 3D shapes. They will also practise reading and making times on analogue clocks.

Questions:

Is this true or false? How do you know? Explain your answer. Where will the hands on the clock be at quarter past 5? Where will the hands be on a clock at twenty to 8?

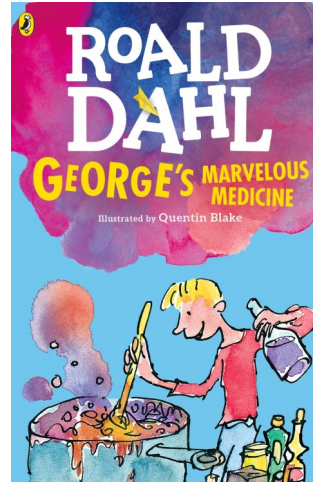
Science:

This half terms focus is animals and humans, habitats and what humans need to survive. This will involve learning about food and exercise.

Questions:

What is a habitat? What types of habitats can you name? What habitat is suitable for an amphibian? What do animals and humans need to survive? What would happen if one of those things was taken away?

Year 2 Term 5



Art:

The children will be developing their sculpturing skills, creating shapes using various materials and tools. They will also be continuing to look at famous artists based around the topic of sculpture and Africa this half term. They will experiment with changing the shape of clay using tools/ their hands.

Geography:

We will be learning about a contrasting place to Milton Keynes, The Masai Mara. We will compare the landscape of the two places and think about how the land is used by people and animals who live in each place.

Computing:

This half term children will be focussing on music. In this unit, children will be using a computer to create music. They will listen to a variety of pieces of music and consider how music can make them think and feel. The children will compare creating music digitally and non-digitally. We will look at patterns and purposefully create music.

PSHE:

This half term the topic is 'Relationships'. We will discuss what it means to be loved and cared for and practise talking about our feelings. Children will discuss how to overcome troubles with friends and how to express their own opinions.

PE:

This half term we will be learning about the importance of exercising and eating the right kinds of foods as part of being fit and healthy, and taking part in a range of athletic activities, including multi skills such as improving our running, jumping and throwing techniques. and movements.

Music:

We will continue to develop our knowledge of both pitch and beat. The children will learn to compose music using these and they will perform using their voices and instruments. The children will also have the opportunity to learn to play African drums.

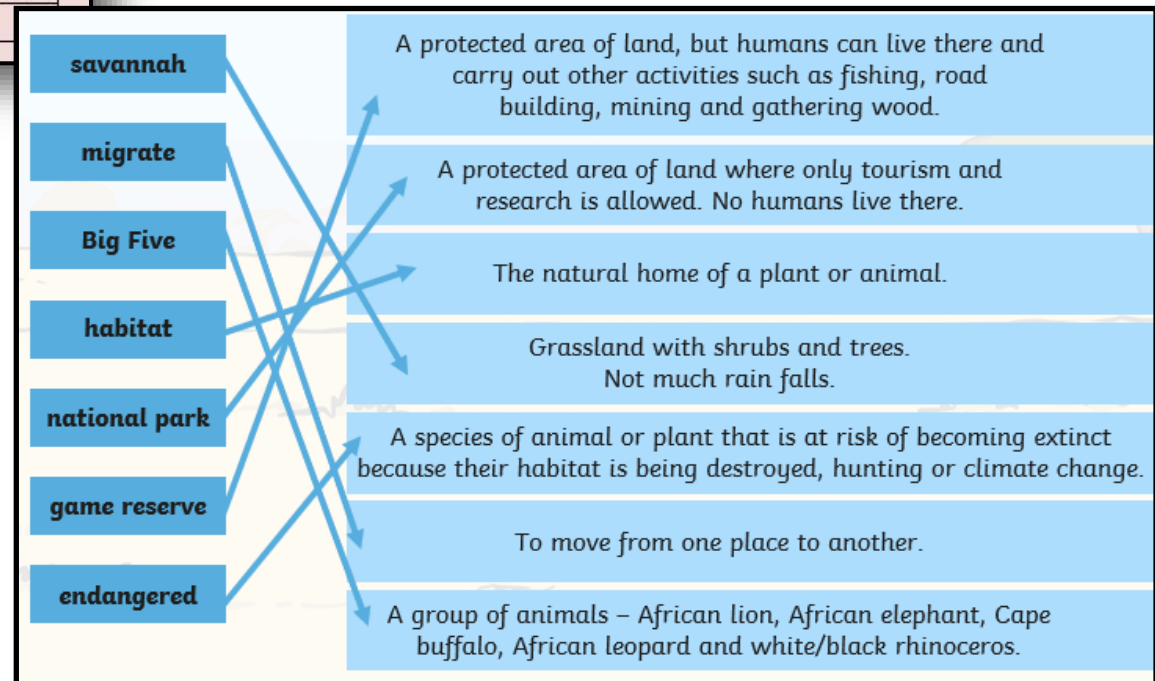
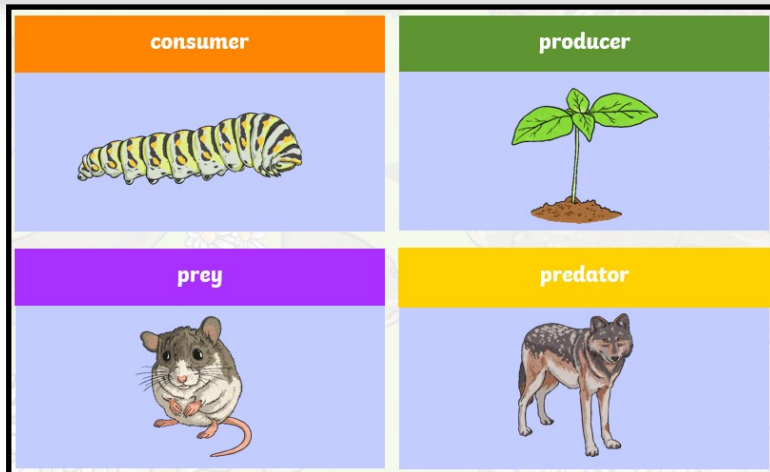
